My dear friends

At the time of writing I don't know where we will be walking with the cross when we remember the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Probably from Coldside Church. The cross is easily glamorised. It is now just over 50 years ago that Malcolm Muggeridge wrote to the 'Observer' newspaper in these terms:

"It was manifestly the most famous death in history. No other death has aroused one-hundredth part of the interest, or been remembered with one hundredth part of the intensity and concern... As for Europe, in countries like Italy and France, it is impossible to go a hundred yards anywhere without being confronted with some version or other of the crucifixion. Since that Golgotha happening, billions upon billions of crucifixes must have been made, from exquisitely-fashioned ones to the most tawdry, gimcrack, mass-produced ones; from huge overpowering Calvaries to little tiny crucifixes to hang around the neck or over the heart, but always with the same essential characteristics — a man at the last extremity of a cruel death, with lolling head, and feet and hands viciously nailed to a wooden cross."

Why the cross? In short, it was the atonement – the 'at-one-moment' – when heaven and earth, God and sinners became reconciled. At what a cost... it was not only an innocent life but that of the divine-human Son of God. As Jesus cried out, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" his question rings up and down through the centuries, calling for an answer.


Emil Brunner, a famous Swiss theologian, answered the question like this: "In the cross of Christ God says to man, 'That is where you ought to be. Jesus, My Son hangs there in your stead. His tragedy is the tragedy of your life. You are the rebel who should be hanged on the gallows. But lo, I suffered instead of you, and because of you, because I love you in spite of what you are. My love for you is so great that I meet you there, there on the cross. I cannot meet you anywhere else. You must meet Me there by identifying yourself with the One on the Cross. It is by this identification that I, God, can meet you in Him, saying to you as I say to Him, My beloved Son."

Jesus Christ is both creator of the cosmos and key to its reconciliation. The cross stands in the centre of human history. People of all background, whether male or female, young or old, straight or LGBT find in Him all that they could most wish to be. The most moving bible study I can recall at the Steeple involved pictures of the cross from a variety of different cultures.

What does 'the cross' mean to you? Someone once expressed it like this: The cross is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace; a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing; a picture of death, yet the key to life; a picture of utter weakness, yet the key to power; a picture of capital punishment, yet the key to mercy and forgiveness; a picture of vicious hatred, yet the key to love; a picture of supreme shame, yet the Christian's supreme boast.

Please join me on Good Friday evening 17 April to meditate on the cross. Meanwhile, God's peace!

CONGREGATIONAL NOTES

There is also a meditation on the events of Good Friday at the Steeple at 7 pm. On Easter Sunday the all-age service is at 10.30 and afterwards Joe Robson is likely to be baptised in the river Tay near St. James and the Lifeboat House.

After my trip last April to the **Ukraine**, I have been invited back to the seminary in Kiev and to Odessa to speak in the University, to student groups and various churches (incl. the Presbyterian Church)

Next September the new Alpha course team will be led by Jim Robertson with a view to making easier to bring our friends. The current Alpha course finishes at the end of April and we will set up a 'Beta' (or 'After-Alpha') group in May-June.

Welcome to Péter and Krisztina Somogyi as new interns from Budapest where they are pastors of the Fasor Hungarian Reformed Church. The congregation runs many activities including their own primary school and kindergarten. They come to Dundee to improve their English language and will volunteer time around the Steeple Church. They are taking a sabbatical from their city-centre ministry from the end of March to the end of May. Their internship is supported by the Europe Committee of the Council of World Mission who are paying for their tutorials and bus passes.

We give a warm welcome to Robin and Celia Liddell who join us from the St. Andrew's Church of Scotland in Brussels. They have been also living and working for European Union in Georgia & Macedonia.

Pizza nights continue from 4-6 pm on the last Sunday of the month for teenagers. Jackie Close and Daniel Spencer continue to support these youngsters who come from several city-centre congregations.

In February it was 'Africa season' on all four Sundays – with stories from Uganda, Rwanda, Kenya and Tanzania. We are very grateful for the loan of bunting from the Council of World Mission.

Throughout March there will be an **intercultural bible-study** at the Steeple on every Sunday between 4.00 and 6.30 pm. We will be using themes from the 'Learning from Africa' folder. House-groups in the Steeple are picking up this material and there is another chance to look at them again on Wednesday evening 27 March. On that night, friends at the Steeple are invited to a short **conference session** with the Presbytery of Dundee.

'Next Stop Please' is the title of an amazing show that caught the limelight of the Edinburgh Fringe last August. Organised by Claire Bee, local people take parts in this production about 'homelessness'. There is no charge but donations are invited – pay what you can!

The 'Vesper Sky' concert on Saturday 16 March is a stunning and unique collection of poems and songs that are written and performed by Stewart Henderson, Yvonne Lyon and Carol Henderson. Tickets are only £7 & can be obtained from reception or through Eventbrite.

Shelter Scotland's 50th Anniversary photographic exhibition in Dundee will be launched at the Steeple Church on Tuesday 12 March from 5.30 to 7.30 pm. It will be on display for a week – don't miss it! Our neighbours from St Mary's will be joining us for coffee after morning worship on Sunday 17 March to give them an opportunity to view the exhibition with us.

FROM THE PARISH NURSES

We sadly missed the deadline for the last edition of the mag, so bear with us – there is lots of news this time.



At the end of October 18 we were all highly excited to be celebrating the wedding of Kirsty and Marc Nelson. They were married at Hillbank Hall, then their beautiful reception was at Carnoustie. It was so good to see this lovely young couple declaring their faith openly and starting life together with faith as the cornerstone of

their future together. Their faith and spiritual growth together is a huge encouragement to us and to all their friends. We wish them every blessing.

In December we joined up again with Eagles Wings to provide Christmas Dinner for all our folk. We had an offer of help, which we could not turn down, from Dean Banks, one of the finalists in Masterchef – the Professionals. You possibly saw a picture of Rachel and I in the Courier with Dean and The Hairdresser – we managed to oust Brexit from the front page of the newspaper for a day!! Dean took over all the meal arrangements apart from the turkey, which was supplied thanks hugely to Malmaison Hotel and delivered on the afternoon, cooked and ready to serve. Dean and his friend Richard did all the rest, the pigs in blankets, stuffing, roasters, gravy and veg. Their real home-made sticky toffee pudding for dessert was a huge hit! But we also need to thank Ashley from Tesco who provided amazing 'goodie bags' for everyone, and Claire from Just Bee Productions for doing the music and singalong. That's to say nothing of the team of the team of Volunteers who came to help, from Eagles Wings, Steeple and quite a few of the people from services that come along to the drop-in, like Shelter and DCC Housing and NHS Homeless Team. Also Dean invited a friend who owns a smart barber shop in the city centre to come and set up salon through in Haldane, and he did fifteen haircuts throughout the afternoon. Amazing!

With the sanctuary decorated, the tree dressed and tables beautifully set, it was a great setting for 130 people that afternoon. The comments of people leaving were heart-warming – 'best meal ever', 'when's he (Dean) coming back', 'Is he cooking next year too?' And our volunteers were megaimpressed too, one admitting that he was moved almost to tears by the sense of love and care and fun that he felt throughout the afternoon. I must say, having annually had the logistic nightmare of organising it all, the day felt a bit like a holiday for me, because there was absolutely nothing to worry about!

That's a good example of how we experience the Lord's care and blessing on our work and the folk we work with. God is good, all the time! Dean is hoping to come back to do a couple of sessions teaching a few of our folk how to cook interesting slow-cooker meals, and to give some nutrition advice – he has a degree in nutrition.

Since Christmas some of our folk have been very ill, and it has been hard to get the support they need at times of emergencies, specially where mental health is concerned. Please pray that drug and mental health services might work in better relationship for our folk. All services are facing cuts in funding and having to do more work with less staff and resources, so please continue to pray for the NHS and the City Council, for wisdom in their management of resources and there will still always be room for genuine compassion in their services.

Please pray too for us in our Parish Nursing work here in Dundee. It can be hard and sad, exhausting and draining. But there are also moments of hope,

of joy and of peace – we need to sustain that balance. Just now we are also looking for a couple of new volunteers to join our team, for about 3 hours max, even once a fortnight would let other volunteers get a day off. We are encouraged enormously that the Steeple Church is able to give Parish Nursing financial support during 2019.
