My dear friends

2020 will be remembered for a very long time! I imagine this conversation in twenty years' time: "Dad, what did you do when the coronavirus came?" "Son, I just tried to survive." Not impressed with his father, the boy turned to his mother, "Mum, what did you do when dad tried to survive?" to which she replied, "Son, I tried not to murder him!" A little dark humour can help!

What will 2020 be remembered for? Maybe the year that the world took climate change seriously. China has committed to end harmful carbon dioxide emissions. The Chinese president announced to the U.N. General Assembly that emissions into the atmosphere would be cut to zero by 2060. This is a wonderful surprise from the biggest producer of these gases.

In 2020, the Steeple Church changed the way decisions are made. We have put our basic policy into everyone's hands by creating teams for everything we are involved in (p5). We want to empower church members and remove any mystery of the role of the Kirk Session. This difficult decision was made necessary by the fact that I still experience weakness and lack of energy more than a year since being hospitalised at Ninewells. After battling with infections, health over the last twelve months has not improved as I had hoped. I find that it's not easy to maintain the vision and energy that a minister of the Steeple Church needs to.

FINANCE TEAM UPDATE

Is it easier to cope with difficulties when a lot of other people are in a similar position? I am not sure whether there is an easy answer to this question but it is relevant to The Steeple just now. Most Churches , and indeed charities generally, are feeling the impact of the pandemic on their finances. In a way we are better placed than many Churches as a high proportion of our income comes from regular giving by standing orders. However, as you can see from the figures below we are having to cope with reduced congregational giving.

In addition, our other main source of income has been hall lets but there have been no lets since lockdown and the future for this source of income is uncertain.

The reduction in income has not been matched by a similar reduction in expenditure as most of our costs are fixed regardless of whether or not the Church building is in use. This year we will be facing a deficit as our budget was set without knowing the impact of Covid. There are many uncertainties about what will happen in 2021 but we will be planning on the basis of reduced income and continuing to pray for wisdom as to how best manage the situation.

Thank you to all those who have continued to financially support the work of The Steeple which continues despite the ongoing and varying restrictions.

GREAT NEWS - after six long months, we have been able to re-open the drop -in session at The Steeple on Monday afternoons. It is so good to be back,

open for business again. Thanks to the Kirk Session we are now able to meet in the Sanctuary area. We've been open for four weeks now, and it has gone really well. We only have eight tables up, so a max of 16 folk in at any time, plus staff in the hall. We are really strict and very good at sticking to all the regulations because we certainly

<u>don't want</u> to become a 'super-spreader' event! I must say, it looks a bit empty, and it is a bit harder to be really welcoming. No hugs allowed.

We try to explain to our folk as they arrive that it's a bit like 'puppy training



class'. They have to come in, sit when and where they are told, and stay there. Masks are given out and temperatures checked before folk even get in the main outside door. A bit of humour is a real help in keeping things from feeling draconian. Then they order their food from one of our team and it's brought to their table (waiter/ress service-

style). Only problem, by the time I got from the table to the serving area I had forgotten if it was tea or coffee, a cheese or a ham roll, how many sugars etc, so now I have a waitress-style notebook.

Folk are really appreciating getting the home-made soup, and hot drinks again, and today's mince rolls were hugely popular (best steak mince, no less).

It's also **BRILLIANT** to have many of our Volunteers back helping on Mondays. They keep everything running like clockwork, and it <u>feels like family again</u>. AND the team of from **EAGLES WINGS** is helping us on Mondays too (and Douglas Street stays closed on a Monday). Big virtual hugs and thanks to Mike, Tony, Alison and Marc.

The NHS HOMELESS TEAM send a Nurse when they can, and the DENTAL VAN is back again too, fixing folks' gnashers.

Rachel, Kirsty and I are continuing to go to Eagles Wings on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. It is getting cold, working out there on the pavement. But folk are coming, with diverse and complex needs, and 'Parish Wings' are there to help. Hallelujah!

If you want any more information, within reason, we are really happy to give that, and we are **ALWAYS GRATEFUL FOR PRAYER SUPPORT**. Please pray that applications for funding grants will be very successful, so that we can continue our work without money worries. Pray too, that we will be able to do something really good for a Christmas meal, somehow...

VISION/VALUES AT THE STEEPLE CHURCH

This is an exercise that the minister has recommended to the Kirk Session. You might like to try it yourself Whenever we consider what the church is and does, we find many areas of crossover and overlap. Take a piece of paper and draw three overlapping circles in a triangular arrangement for 'Worship', 'Community' and 'Mission'. The area around it is the city-centre of Dundee. The central area (where all three circles overlap) resembles a 'heart' and represents our values (or spirituality). Take the name of each 'team' in the Steeple (see below) and try to place them into this circular diagram. As you try to put the different teams somewhere in these circles, you will find yourself asking if it is more about worship, community or mission. It depends on how your 'vision' of the Steeple Church. Think about what it is and what it should be. Is, for example, 'small groups' in worship, community or mission? You might think that it is mainly about community but if they should be also for reaching out to new people you might place it in the area for 'community/mission'. These are some 'teams' at The Steeple:

Within "Nurturing Ministries": Prayer, Developing Worship, Music, Children & Teenagers, Young Adults, World Mission

Within "Local Mission": Community Engagement, Parish Nursing, Café Church, Alpha, Connections Café

Within "Fellowship Ministries": Pastoral Care, Social Fellowship, Steeple Men, Home Groups

Within "Support Ministries": Finance, Building Management, Hall Marketing, Data Protection, Communication, Catering, Technology, Human Resources

As I try to do this, it is not easy and I find myself asking bigger questions such as 'what is mission'? Prayer is at least one of the teams in 'my' centre.

THE VISION STATEMENT OF 'THE STEEPLE CHURCH DUNDEE':

"Our vision is of a Bible-based church that is vibrant with prayerful people who worship and serve Jesus Christ and attract others to follow Him."

Our objectives in achieving this vision are:

- Becoming a people renewed for Christian service through personal spiritual growth in Christ.
- Becoming a people prepared for Christian service through training in discipleship and evangelism.
- Becoming a people, inspired by God's love and renewed by his Spirit, who will respond to the many opportunities of mission in our community and worldwide.
- Becoming a people who by seeking to impact the community around will endeavour to develop our church life in a way that is non-threatening and accessible to those of all ages and lifestyles.
- Becoming a people who are committed to youth ministry within both the church family and the wider community.
- Becoming a people who will be willing to serve Jesus Christ through appropriate partnerships with city agencies, Christian organisations and other churches.
- Becoming a people who will seek to provide appropriate buildings which are flexible for the ministry needs of the church.

The Vision Statement above is a slightly amended and updated version of the 2002 Vision Statement prepared by the Kirk Session. The above version was adopted in 2012 at the time of redevelopment of the building. As mentioned in Robert's letter the Kirk Session is currently reviewing our vision as a city-centre church in 2020.

STEEPLE STRETCH

Over the next year I'd like to put together a world map which shows how far we stretch. The families we belong to are dotted about all over the place: Dundee, Scotland, UK, Europe, Canada, USA, Australia, New Zealand, India, the African continent, the Middle & Far East.... and on and on we go.

The places and people we are connected with may be haphazard and not especially planned but they are not accidental. We find ourselves, providentially, with the God-given calling of being what Jesus (Mark 11:17) called "[God's]...house of prayer for the nations". I wonder how wide our stretch is! Once I gather the information I'll let you see on a world map how far our

global reach is. This will give us a welcome focus for our prayer life and reveal the openings where we can expand the kind of prayer vision Jesus loves.

I'm working at devising a STEEPLE STRETCH survey form which should be in circulation before the end of the year. When it arrives please complete and return it so we can all catch a vision for the places and people God would like us to pray and hold in our hearts.





Despite the difficulties that they face every day, through poverty, illness, disability, or other disadvantages, receiving a shoebox brings such joy to children and adults in Eastern Europe, that their faces light up with huge smiles. You can make such a difference to lives that are otherwise almost hopeless.

If you are having a problem sourcing an empty shoebox this year then please use a drawstring bag (no plastic ones please) instead. Maximum size 400mm x 300mm. These are available in a number of shops, especially sports shops.

Our Kirk Session has formed a Steeple Church family link with a UK and Dundee network called Mahabba (love).

The vision statement on its website reads:

WHO WE ARE, WHAT WE DO & WHAT MAKES US TICK

OUR VISION: To see ministry among people of Muslim heritage as a normal part of church life. This is the picture of the future that inspires and drives Mahabba. When the Mahabba Network is successful in its mission, churches engage well with people of a Muslim heritage.

OUR MISSION: Mahabba operates as a relational network, which gives people of Muslim heritage the opportunity to find and follow Jesus.

Encouraging prayer: Helping to grow regular, persistent prayer for Muslims (core value of persistent prayer).

Enabling all Christians: Helping to see the opportunities, grow in confidence, build friendships and share Jesus with Muslims (core value of mobilising 'everyday' Christians).

Envisioning the Christian community: Inspiring church leadership with what God is doing and helping churches see their own vision fulfilled for Muslims to have the opportunity to follow Jesus (core value of church leadership championing the vision).

Engaging with Muslims: Helping local churches to build bridges with local Muslim communities in order to reach out in love; share Jesus and nurture Christ-followers who reach out in their own community (core value of growing disciples).

You can download a checklist of items to include in your box and instructions for filling it on the website www.shoeboxappeal.org - you can also view videos about the shoe box appeal. Download a checklist and decide on the age of the person you want to fill a box for. There are certain essential items that should be included and a range of suggestions for other things.
