Defeat or victory?

On the evening of 18 June in 1815 a man stood in the tower of Winchester Cathedral looking anxiously out to sea. At last he found the ship he was looking for as everyone wanted to know the outcome of the war between the Duke of Wellington and Napoleon Bonaparte of France. The signal came just as a heavy fog was rolling in. It simply read: "Wellington defeated" and the man relayed the sad news across the country. But then as the fog lifted, the message was seen in full: "Wellington defeated the enemy"!

Easter 2019

Easter Day is a great day when Christians celebrate the victory of the cross. It is the day when we learn that God is real. The Son of God who was crucified for our sins is now alive from the dead. On Good Friday it seemed the message was "Christ defeated." The resurrection on Easter Day reversed this and we see "Christ defeated the enemy!" This year we again celebrated Easter Day with an all-age service at the Steeple Church and a baptism in the river Tay opposite St. James' Church in Broughty Ferry. It was good to welcome Joe Robson's parents from the isle of Arran together with other visitors. In the last few years I hear lots of people ask if they can be baptised. Some watched the baptisms next to the Lifeboat House while others have come to a place where they don't want to return to the past.

Baptism

Easter is when people have traditionally got baptised as Christians. The very visual impact of going down into the cold waters of the silvery Tay and back up again is a picture of death and resurrection... death of the old life and risen to a new one. It takes courage to do this – but baptism is less about what 'we do' and more about what 'God does'. I seek sincerity as my task is to try to prepare them about Christian faith beforehand.

Baptism is 'into Christ', not into the church. That means that we accept everyone's baptism whether it was in a different kind of church or as a baby. Every church should recognise this and not require people to be baptised again. The scriptures remind us that there is "one Lord, one faith and one baptism" (Ephesians 4:5). Baptism is a 'once and for all' event where we repent of the past and put on the badge of Christian faith. Whether you are baptised as a baby or later in life, it shouldn't be repeated. I once wrote to a pastor of a Pentecostal Church in South America for a couple who had

been baptised and had served Christ in an exemplary way in the Netherlands. I asked him to accept my testimonial on their behalf so that when they joined his congregation that they didn't need to be baptised again. Baptism is a badge of belonging to God's people, not any one church.

Psychological health

God cares for our physical, mental and spiritual health. Baptism is psychologically important for everyone, especially for those suffering from poor mental health. Martin Luther, for example, who suffered severe bouts of depression would cry out "I have been baptised!" I also love to baptise children where we claim God's covenant love upon them from their earliest days. Baptism is psychologically important for parents and grand-parents.

In the Steeple Church we recently baptised Cheryl Ferguson's daughter Rio. In St. James Church we recently baptised a baby where her grand-parents made vows. Baptism reminds us that God has undertaken to watch over our children and guard them. But sometimes those who have been baptised as babies, when older, want to mark their new experience of Christ in some way. So last year we created a liturgy called 'affirmation of baptism' where we invite their parents to be present. Those who want to commit their lives to Christ can now rejoice in taking vows made for them by their parents.

God's family

In the past, when we baptise adults or teenagers in the church on a Sunday morning, it was often followed by being welcomed as members of 'God's family'. We still do that but it can be healthy to have a period of time between baptism and joining the church. This time gives space to reflect on what God has done and another opportunity for a public commitment.

"O Jesus, I have promised to serve Thee to the end; Be Thou for ever near me, my Master and my Friend. I shall not fear the battle if Thou art by my side, Nor wander from the pathway if Thou wilt be my guide."

CONGREGATIONAL NOTES - FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...

Ukraine – thanks you for your prayers when I was in the Ukraine. I had a wonderful time there and found speaking for two weeks to be rejuvenating. I spoke to pastors in Kiev and Odessa about how to get a vision for their city and how to overcome obstacles. I also got to talk with secular students at the Law Academy about drugs, studying different cultures and the meaning of life. All of the messages including preaching on Sundays were translated into Russian, (though Ukrainian is now the official language). Ukraine has the largest single land mass of any country in Europe and is important for its grain and metal-working industries. Please pray for the development of Ukrainian identity with its new president, problems of corruption and the Russian occupation in the east of the country.



Peter and Krisztina Somogyni – from the Fasor Reformed Church in Budapest, Hungary. We are delighted to welcome these pastors of a busy and effective city ministry that has many young people and a kindergarten. They have five children and their youngest daughter Johann joined them for two weeks over Easter. They return to Budapest at the end of May.

Café nights & Alpha course – this is a reminder that we are splitting this to create a separate Alpha night from September for those who have never attended it and a different interactive evening where we aim to disciple and support one another. The first of these Café nights start up in May and June before we take a break in July and August.

Personal news – I expect to be away from 5-11 June (incl. Sunday 8th) to take part in a 'walking football' festival in the Netherlands with 'Ardler Wanderers'. I will also be away on the weeks leading up to 14 and 21 July the wedding of our youngest son Daniel to Emilie at the Glen Clova Hotel.

Governance is a big word to describe how we make decisions! The Steeple church is in the process of moving to a new way of making decisions and organizing our affairs. With responsibilities of data protection, health & safety and safeguarding, we want more people to be involved in teams that focus on different areas of ministry. At some point in the near future we will consult about and outline these new opportunities for involvement.

FINANCE UPDATE

The accounts for 2018 show that expenditure exceeded income by approximately £18,000. There was a marginal decline (2.3 %) in congregational giving but the main reason for the deficit was increased expenditure. A one off annual deficit is not a major problem as there have been some surpluses in previous years. However, it does become a problem if it is repeated. We are monitoring expenditure carefully in the current year to try and ensure it is within budget and there is currently a restriction on any improvements, this will be reviewed in the summer.

Members of the congregation continue to give generously both financially and in terms of volunteering to assist with hall lets. Without hall letting income we would not be able to fund many of our activities. This year hall lets income is specifically being used to fund the Caretaker post and make a £5,000 contribution to Parish Nursing costs.

We are grateful for all the donations to the Church and would remind everyone that if you are a taxpayer your contribution will be increased by 25% if you agree to Gift Aid your donation. Please see me if you have any queries regarding Gift Aid.

If you wish to make a donation specifically for mission outreach work then please advise the Treasurer and this will be added to the specific fund (The Charles Smith Fund) which we hold for that purpose.

FROM THE PARISH NURSES

Kirsty, Rachel and I are all feeling a bit 'conferenced out' – March to April has been a busy time for us, of fruitful learning and fellowship, we hope. The UK Parish Nursing symposium was great, down in Derbyshire; there was a lot of very interactive learning together with our speakers, so we came home with new skills, and also had the opportunity to refresh other specific practice topics. The Queen's Nursing Institute for Scotland conference was at Murrayfield. There were inspirational speakers, plus further learning acquired by all of us. The Scottish Homeless Inclusion Health Conference (hope I got that long-winded title correct) was also in Edinburgh, and was again very good value for the day in terms of networking in particular.

The numbers of folk coming to the drop-in sessions always fluctuates, and we can never tell how many will come. But numbers are between 25 and 44 this year, which is maybe up a bit on average. We are seeing more people who are having difficulty because of Universal Credit. We are really grateful to staff from the City Council and from Shelter, who can give expert advice about housing and assistance with benefits and with appeals about benefit non-awards. We are always glad to have The NHS Homeless Team with us — Hazel is really one of us nowadays; and the Dental team are a great benefit to our folk as well.

Many of the folk we see and listen with have real spiritual needs as well as all the physical, mental and social issues, and we pray with them quite often, specially when they feel bogged down in hopelessness, fear and guilt. This is an important part of our work, and often an opportunity to witness to God's caring and forgiving love for all who repent. Pray for us as we are involved in frontline mission among our folk very frequently, and get to know some of them very well.

We have welcomed a couple of new Volunteers to our team in recent months, and in the same time a couple have retired from regular volunteering. We could not do this work without their cheerful and loving support – Thank you All.

The Thursday morning group is growing and thriving, with crafts, music and activities that help the women to feel welcome and cared about; 7 or 8 women are attending. And RecoverSing is also very well-attended, with up to 30 people having a really good singalong. We are so grateful to Claire for her work and the changes it is achieving week-by-week in those attending. There is a real sense of belonging and gently-growing self confidence.

Joining God's mission in the city centre – thoughts from the Local Mission Team

God invites you to join Him in His mission to the city centre; not just the Local Mission Team (LMT) whose remit from the Kirk Session is "to reflect, supervise development, and make proposals to the Kirk Session on the development of our mission activities such as Open Mondays, Messy Church and Café Church. The LMT would also interface with Hot Chocolate and Parish Nursing. Over and above this, they could look at training, advise on or plan special events and form the nucleus of a support group for a new worker. The LMT would not be made up of elders only, but drawn from those with a heart for mission, and who are already involved in some aspect of local mission".

The LMT first met in June 2017 and comprise, as the Kirk Session suggested, people with a heart for mission, who are 'already involved in some aspect of local mission' but no one is excluded; all Steeple people are welcome, and notification of upcoming meetings is given in the Sunday notice sheet. The challenge of accommodating the Kirk Session's wide-ranging remit for the LMT, whilst giving space for thoughtful reflection, was addressed to some extent by sharing a meal together during a three-hour evening meeting.

Throughout our conversation around the many mission activities within the orbit of the Steeple community, we have sought to keep at the forefront, three foundational questions: Who are we as members of the Christian Community at the Steeple? What do we mean by the gospel? And, what do we mean by mission in our city centre context?

Who are we, the Christian Community at the Steeple?

Peter writes in his epistle (1 Peter 2:9) that Christians are "a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light."

The royalness makes reference to our responsibility as God's vice-regents to reflect his love and just rule into the world. The priesthood refers to our responsibility to reflect the world's praises back to God and also bring the pain and needs of the world into the presence of God through prayer and by working to alleviate it.

We are to be like an angled mirror. The point of an angled mirror is that it reflects one thing to another; in this case God to the world (engaging the 'other') and the world back to God (worship and bringing the pain and needs of the world into His presence)

If we really grasp the significance of this and the significance of Easter as the 'the day the world became a whole new place', and begin to understand more of who we are in Christ we will see the 'other', our neighbours, the world, and ourselves a little better and perhaps help us to more accurately envision God's invitation to join him in His mission to our city. Jesus rescues us from everything that's getting in the way of our being fully human. He enables us to be fully human again. Jesus enables damaged, broken and hurting people to be flourishing human beings again.

What do we mean by gospel?

The good news is that the creator God has acted decisively to put the world to rights. The message which announces that Jesus is Lord and calls us to obedience, contains the remedy: forgiveness, unearned and freely given, because of his cross, to which all we can say is, "Thank you."...The good news that Jesus is the one true "emperor," ruling the world with his own brand of self-giving love. The good news entrusted to us in the Steeple community.

What do we mean by *mission*?

The word "mission" comes from the Latin for "send": "As the father sent me," said Jesus after his resurrection, 'so I am sending you' (John 20:21).

As Christians, we exist for mission: to announce to the world that Jesus is its Lord. This is the "good news" (gospel) and when it's announced it transforms people and societies. God intends to put the world to rights; he has dramatically launched this project through Jesus. Those who belong to Jesus are called, here and now, in the power of the Spirit, to be agents of that putting-to-rights purpose in whatever context we are including the city centre.

In Jesus' own teaching, it is clear that people who are called to be agents of God's healing love, putting the world to rights, are called also to be people whose own lives are put to rights by the same healing love. The messengers must model the message. The LMT would love to see more helpers in our regular outreach, for example Family Playgroup, Open Mondays and Fridays and Connections Cafe and also in special events.

A forthcoming opportunity for mission in the city centre

The city centre will be busy in June! The schools are on holiday, many visitors will come to our city and the sun will shine (perhaps). In addition, the World Community Development Conference will be held in Dundee from $24^{th} - 26^{th}$ June with delegates from all over the UK and beyond.

Between 24th and 30th June the Steeple will host several events during the Scottish Refugee Festival which will begin on the afternoon of the 24th with an official opening event for all the family. During the week the work of two gifted young refugees who have made a home in our city will be on display as well as a contribution from further afield. A new art installation from Alistair and Katy Emslie -Smith will be augmented by an installation from a young artist in London. Material from organisations supporting refugees in a variety of contexts across the world will be displayed during the week. In the midst of this busyness there will be space for reflection and prayer during Wednesday afternoon and on Sunday evening. Our Erskine prayer room will be available throughout the week for those who wish to pray or be prayed for. In addition to these Steeple-based activities Connections Cafe will welcome visitors for coffee and Arabic snacks. On Friday 28th at the Blend Coffee Lounge, 'Refugee Voices' will provide an opportunity to listen to an evening of music, performance and sharing stories. All these events will be promoted in the World Community Development Conference programme.

A busy time, but a God-given opportunity for us in the Steeple community to engage with locals and visitors from across the world who will be in and around the Steeple. All of us have a part to play, whether on Reception, or being around to welcome and chat to visitors. More details about the opportunities to be involved in will follow soon. In the meantime, please don't hesitate to contact John Clark if you would like to know more.
